Father Thomas Duston is a native of New Hampshire, who grew up in the area around Mount Monadnock. He attended St. Joseph Catholic elementary school, and then went to public High School. Fr. Thom then went to college at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute before going to Seminary at St. John's in Boston, Mass. Ordained a priest for the Diocese of Manchester in 1992, he began serving as pastor four years later. Fr. Thom has had four assignments as pastor, and served 8 parishes as



pastor. In addition to being a pastor, Fr. Thom is the Wing Chaplain at the NH Air National Guard base in Portsmouth, NH. This means he provides ministry to its members and oversees all the Chaplain activities for the 157th Air Refueling Wing. Over the last few years he has also been learning Spanish and now provides the regional Mass in Spanish for South East NH and Southwest Maine. Fr. Thom received a certificate in Sign Language Interpreting back in the year 2000 and has served in Deaf Ministry since then. At this time this means working with several teams of interpreters, and several times a year driving to various locations to offer Confession and sometimes Mass or funerals.



Development (CCHD) is the domestic antipoverty program of the U.S. Catholic Church. It was founded in 1969 and established in 1970 to respond to both sys-

temic poverty and racial injustice occurring throughout the country. Since beginning its work in 1970, CCHD has awarded **over** \$462 million in grants supporting more than 12,000 community-based, grassrootsled organizations. The Catholic Campaign for Human Development provides grants to more than 200 low-income, community-led organizations each year, (including La Cosecha Community Supported Agriculture in Albuquerque) which is made possible thanks to the generous contributions of Catholics to the annual collection every No-

vember on the World Day of the Poor. In the United States, more than 11% of the population lives in poverty. Through this collection, you support programs that address the root causes of poverty and provide a sustainable future for those

struggling across the country. In addition, 25% of the funds we collect remain in our archdiocese to fund local anti-poverty projects. MESSAGE OF HIS HOLINESS POPE FRANCIS FOR THE EIGHT WORLD DAY OF THE POOR (Nov. 17): The prayer of the poor rises up to God (cf. Sir 21:5)

Sunday, November 17, 2024, is the World Day of the Poor, a day established by Pope Francis in 2017 for Catholics to "reflect on how poverty is at the very heart of the Gospel." The theme for 2024 is "The prayer of the poor rises up to God" (Sirach 21:5)."The poor hold a privileged place in God's heart," Pope Francis said in his message for the day. "God knows the sufferings of his children because he is an attentive and caring father. As a father, he takes care of those who are most in need: the poor, the marginalized, the suffering, and the forgotten. No one is excluded from his heart, for in his eyes, we are all poor and needy. We are all beggars because without God, we would be nothing." The pope stressed that God will never abandon us and will never leave us without a response to our prayers. "He does not forget you nor could he ever do so. We all have had the experience of prayers that seem to remain unanswered. Sometimes, we ask to be freed from a misery that makes us suffer and humiliates us, and God seems not to hear our cry. However, God's silence does not mean he is inattentive to our sufferings; rather, it contains a word that must be received with trust, surrendering ourselves to him and to his will," Pope Francis said. Why Pope Francis established the day in 2017?

After the Year of Mercy, the pope said he wanted to set aside a day so that, throughout the world, Christian communities could

become even greater signs of Christ's charity for those in need. We are called, Pope Francis wrote in his first World Day of the Poor message, "to draw near to the poor, to encounter them, to meet their gaze, to embrace them, and to let them feel the warmth of love that breaks through their solitude. Their outstretched hand is also an invitation to step out of our certainties and comforts, and to acknowledge the value of poverty in itself."

The pope said that for Christ's disciples, "poverty is, above all, a call to follow Jesus in his own poverty," and he asked Catholics to take as their example Saint Francis of Assisi, who kept his gaze fixed on Christ, allowing him to see and serve the poor. Catholic Relief Services Update: Holy Land Crisis: Escalation into Southern Lebanon

Catholic Relief Services and its partners in Lebanon are prioritizing a range of programs to address the emergency shelter, and emotional and social support needs of vulnerable families affected by conflict. Over 113,729 people have been displaced since September. CRS has deep roots in Lebanon, where it works with local partners, including faithbased, interfaith and secular organizations. Emergency response has long been an area of focus. More recently, CRS has been supporting the recovery and rebuilding of homes and infrastructure damaged in the 2020 Beirut port blast. CRS continues to provide education and emotional and social support to vulnerable people, including Syrian refugees in



Lebanon. CRS support for the current escalating action. emergency in

and emotional and social needs of displaced and conflict-affected communities. Since October 2023, the ongoing conflict in Gaza has had ripple effects across the region, including in Lebanon, where continued armed confrontations along the southern border with Israel have resulted in a deepening humanitarian crisis. Since mid-September, the conflict has taken a turn for the worse, with widespread detonations of electronic devices across Lebanon, as well as intensified air raids across the south, the southern suburbs of the capital, Beirut, and the Bekaa Valley, east of the capital. The latest figures from Lebanon's Ministry of Health indicate that recent air raids caused more than 550 deaths and wounded 1,835 in just three days, with many women and children among the dead. CRS is already working with Caritas Lebanon and other partners on a range of programs to address the emergency shelter and emotional and social support needs of vulnerable families affected by the conflict. CRS support for the current escalating emergency in southern Lebanon will continue to evolve to meet the shelter and emotional and social needs of displaced and conflictaffected communities.

The Conference of the States Parties at its 20th Session decided that a memorial Day of Remembrance for all Victims of Chemical Warfare would be observed on 30 November each year or, when appropriate, on the first day of the regular session of the Conference. On January 11, 2022, Archbishop Wester released a pastoral letter calling for dialogue on nuclear disarmament called Living in the Light of Christ's Peace: A Conversation Toward Nuclear Disarmament, In the letter, Archbishop reflects on his own recent trip to Hiroshima and Nagasaki, the history of Catholic social teaching on nuclear weapons, and the history of the development of nuclear weapons in New Mexico. Action Alert:

From USCCB: Urge Congress to Pass Legislation that Affirms the Dignity of **Stateless Persons**

The United Nations estimates that there are millions of people across the globe who do not have a nationality and are therefore stateless. According to international law, as ratified in the 1954 Conven-Alert tion Related to the Status of

Stateless Persons, a stateless person is one "who is not considered as a national by any state under the operation of its law". Consequences of statelessness can include a lack of legal protection, limited or no access to health care, education, and registration of birth, infringements on the rights to marry and own property, an inability to travel, and an increased vulnerability to human trafficking. In March 2024, Representative Jamie Raskin and Senator Ben Cardin reintroduced the "Stateless Protection Act of 2024", which would address statelessness in federal law for the first time in U.S. history. The bill would:

- Adopt the international law definition of "stateless person", thus providing a definition of statelessness for the first time is U.S. law:
- Afford protection to stateless persons present in the United States through a new form of relief and path to permanent residency known as Stateless Protected Status:
- Promote education and research on statelessness through partnerships with universities, international organizations, and nongovernmental organizations; and
- Encourage engagement with other countries to establish stateless status determination and protection legislation. The U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' (USCCB) Committee on Migration and Committee on International Justice and Peace formally endorsed the bill in July. The committees affirmed the political right to a nationality, stating, "motivated by our belief that each person is endowed by God with an inherent dignity that confers certain 'universal, inviolable, and inalienable' rights, the USCCB is deeply concerned for those who have been deprived of the most basic of political rights—their national identity."



Ecumenical Formation For Lay Catholics

There has been a great consensus at Synod Assemblies – both worldwide and locally - that we need to foster ecumenism in our com-

munities. "It is noteworthy that this need to support ecumenical formation and opportunities for lay Catholics was not even a matter of debate – for me it seemed more like a fruit that has grown ripe and is ready to enjoy after all these years of a formal ecumenical movement, into which the Catholic church entered after Vatican II and has held to be of great importance ever since. There is a strong consensus that ecumenism belongs at the local level no less than at the level of appointed exporter representa-

tives and national and international dialogues. This is a fruit of the synodal process that can be enjoyed now in parishes – where it is up to each parish community to discern how to deepen their mutual learning and exchange of gifts with their Christian neighbors." (A recent quote taken from an interview with Sr. Natalie Becquart, XMCJ, National Director of the Service for Evangelization of Young People and Vocations in France.)

This undertaking does require training and practice, not just good will and it needs to be undertaken with care and preparation. The Ecumenical and Interreligious Commission of the Archdiocese of Santa Fe, under the leadership of Msgr. B. Voorhies, offers on-site workshops at your parish to prepare lay faithful in ecumenical formation.
